1 "YOU CAN'T MAKE ME!" – TREATING ODD CLIENTS *(basic - intermediate)*

Oppositional Defiance is a DSM-IV diagnosis for a pattern of negativistic, hostile, and defiant behaviors lasting at least six months. Working with these types of clients as children or teenagers is often a task of frustration and test of personal tolerance. Understanding how to unhook from oppositional behaviors is key to engaging clients in task completion as well as relationship building.

During this session, participants will:

- Learn to clarify the difference between oppositional defiance that is covert vs. overt
- Identify barriers to successful treatment
- Identify what leads to successful treatment for oppositionally defiant clients
- Share tools for success in working with oppositional defiance

2 WORKING WITH SEXUAL ABUSE VICTIMS *(intermediate)*

In the United States, child sexual abuse is reported up to 80,000 times a year, but the number of unreported instances is far greater. Children are afraid to tell others what happened, and the legal procedure for validating an episode is difficult. The long-term emotional and psychological damage of sexual abuse can be devastating to the child. It is important to provide relief from the symptoms of trauma and to teach clients appropriate grounding skills.

During this session, participants will learn:

- Treatment approaches to facilitate recovery from childhood to adult sexual abuse.
- Interventions helpful in reducing symptoms and effecting long term relief from unresolved prior trauma.
